CONSERVATION REPLY

These points are taken from a letter received from BDBC Senior Conservation Officer in reply to the resident's letter published in the last issue of Blurb- Issue 13 March 2002.

- 1. The local authority considers that Brookvale is an area of special historic and architectural interest. This is the reason it is designated a Conservation Area and why Article 4(2) Directions have been imposed to ensure that traditional windows and doors are not lost.
 - 2. The controls cover only parts of the building which face the road.
- 3. Replacing windows with timber sash windows may be more expensive than replacing with UPVC but this is not the only or best option. It is often possible to repair timber sash windows for much less than the cost of UPVC replacements. Timber is the ultimate ecological material, sustainable, recyclable and biodegradable. UPVC creates problems in its production, use and disposal, giving off toxic dioxins as it burns.
- 3. Timber windows can be effectively draught-proofed, reducing heatloss and can be secondary double glazed.



- 5. Grants have been available since January 1999 for the repair of buildings or reinstatement of historic features. Though publicised in the press and at public meetings, only 2 applicants have applied and received subsequent grants. The Grant Criteria are under review and any new grants are likely to be available from September 2002.
- 6. Regarding funding for projects within the Conservation Area, such as street lighting, paving, railings and street signage works, these could be funded through the Conservation Enhancement Grant budget. The views of the community are sort and discussion invited on environmental improvements. (See Blurb Issue 11 November 2001)
- 7. Basingstoke and Deane have produced an information package of advice notes on "The Brookvale House", including advice on the repair of historic buildings within the Brookvale Conservation Area, energy efficiency and sustainability.

NB It was the Council who designated Brookvale a Conservation Area to safeguard the area from developers after a battle to stop Brookvale School being demolished and a large block of flats being built on the site.

The Council gave Brookvale residents the chance to put their views forward, unfortunately many did not do so. The majority of those who did bother to reply were in favour. Thus the designation of Brookvale as a Conservation Area.

Victory Roundabout

The meeting on 7th March ended with it looking as though a dual situation would be requested—Pedestrian Lights and Subways.

The risk analysis supplied by HCC stated that it would not be advisable to put in pedestrian lights on Victory Roundabout. It would be better to keep the subways. A representative of HCC had been asked to attend but 'they do not make a habit of appearing at such meetings'. It was minuted that this was 'unfortunate'.

Residents present supported the subway option. The improved pumps seem to be keeping the flooding in hand, though a dry winter is not giving the best comparison. A proper maintenance programme and maybe a crossing on Timberlake Road in the area of Mortimer Lane seemed another option. It was requested that the possibility of this crossing be put on HCC agenda.

The thumbnail sketch we had requested, giving an idea of where the crossing may be sited is not yet available. Crime figures for 2000 show 3 incidents affecting subways in the Brookvale area.

The following will be discussed at the next meeting: Information from Emergency Services, Report on why pedestrian lights and subways cannot be used at the same time and a specific Maintenance Programme.

The BCA sub committee are to survey the roundabout for feasible ideas to make it more pedestrian friendly. The date of the next meeting is still to be arranged.
