What does the future hold for BCA?

Brookvale Community Association's AGM is coming up in May. It is always the most important event in the Association's diary, but this year it is actually more important to the larger Brookvale community.

The BCA is faced with a real problem at the 2004 AGM. Despite dwindling numbers of committee members at monthly meetings, and an all-time low attendance of BCA-organised events by the Brookvale public, the core group of volunteers, the usual faces, have continued to keep it all together for the last few years. people know how important the BCA is as a voice for the Brookvale community, an organisation that has organised countless events which the local residents have always enjoyed taking part in. It is a simple fact that Brookvale Community Association is at the centre of the 'community spirit' Brookvale is renowned for.

The Village Hall is probably the biggest headache for the Association. The Hall really should have around 10-15 committed volunteers assigned to keeping it functioning effectively, volunteers that can concentrate purely on the Hall. Currently, the same small group of Committee Members who are running the Association are also having to look after the running of the Hall. It is a situation that cannot be sustained for much longer. It feels like the Association is purely in existence to support the running of the hall, both financially and physically.

It will hardly come as a surprise to you to discover that all of the current Officers have indicated that they will be stepping down this year. It does appear to those on the Committee that the community now seems completely disinterested in the Association and its activities, and so it is no wonder the current officers feel they have no more energy or fresh ideas to keep the organisation going.

It is extremely important that you, the community, attend the AGM in May. The Association will be asking:

Does the community still need and want the Association? We believe that the Association has done so much for Brookvale over the years, and continues to look after the best interests of Brookvale residents. We feel it would be a real shame if the BCA had to be dissolved.

Do we lose the hall and give it up to the council? The BCA has done so much over the years to provide a central venue that belongs to and exists for the benefit of the community... Raising funds and grants for its original construction in 1983, raising funds for its extension in 1987, putting it all back together after the arson attack of December 1999 (which completely destroyed part of the building and wrecked the entire interior). We really do feel it would be terrible if the hall had to be surrendered to the council. The

community would no longer have its own venue in which to hold events. But what do you think? Are 10-15 people prepared to run the hall for the Association?

Should the Street system be changed? The idea was that Street Reps would be that important link between the residents and the Association. They are the people who have in the past delivered Blurb and other leaflets, and spoken to residents bringing their issues to the Association and subsequently answered their concerns. list of Street Reps is now virtually non-existent and the majority of those who remain on the list are either part of the core Committee, already giving up hours of their time, or are unhappy to give out their contact details to their neighbours. The core Committee Members simply don't have the time to do everything else. Should we change the way we interact with the community?

If you decide that the Association and Hall are to stay, it is up to the Brookvale community to turn the Association around. We would need to appoint new Officers, Committee Members, Street Reps and other volunteers across the board.

If the responsibilities were shared across a larger number of people, each person would only have to give up maybe two or three hours of their time each

Wheelie bins

Please could you ensure that you take your grey and green wheelie bins in ON THE ACTUAL COLLECTION DAY after refuse has been collected. Abandoned bins not only cause obstructions to pedestrians and wheelchairs, but

have also been responsible for a recent incident in which three empty bins were used by vandals to cause extensive damage to a parked car in George Street.

Recycling

How is the fortnightly recycling scheme working for you? One of the main objections from most residents is that glass and other materials are not permitted in the green bins. Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council would like to hear your views about the current scheme.

Cllr John Shaw reported at our January committee meeting that glass recycling is already being run as a pilot scheme in the Hart district. Unsecured outbuildings

There have recently been three separate incidents where vandals have discovered paint in sheds and other outbuildings in the service road between Lower Brook Street and George Street, and then used it to decorate the streets and pavements. PLEASE ensure that any paint left outside is kept in a secure, locked place. Thank you to the considerate George Street residents, who have kindly cleaned up the affected areas with

their own pressure washers on these occasions.

Victory Roundabout

Hampshire County Council and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council are now in agreement that traffic lights will not go ahead on Victory Roundabout. A decision has yet to be reached on how the money will be spent.

King George V play area

The works on the construction of the new play area and installation of a goal post at King George V Playing Field have been completed, although concerns have been raised over the placing of the goal post as it would mean people using it would be firing balls at the play area.

Fletcher Close play area

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council are currently looking into an improvement to the play area at Fletcher Close and are asking for people's views. Please address your views to our local councillors (contact details on the back page).

The Brookvale Lottery was set up in 1976 to help raise money for the building of our Village Hall. Today, the lottery raises funds for the day-to-day running of the hall. The Lottery is open to residents of Brookvale.

The membership fee is 10p per year, then the cost of playing is 10p per week. To save the time of our valued volunteers, we ask that membership is committed to on a yearly basis. So if you'd like to play the lottery, we ask that you pay a renewal of £5.30 for the entire year (including 52 weeks play and the yearly membership). 
